

CORE COURSES

Investigate the Ancient Civilization studies major

Seek out Greek, Jewish, or Roman art and philosophy books at the Worcester Art Museum and the Worcester Public Library.

Dig in and define your interests

Try out a 200-level Hebrew, philosophy, Art History, or Latin literature course. Gain a deeper understanding of Greco-Roman Antiquity, Jewish history, or aspects of Art History.

Start networking


